

JUSTICE AND CHARITY MINISTRY

SHARE THE JOURNEY

Every week, we have a small bulletin announcement about the worldwide Catholic "Share the Journey" campaign in support of immigrants and refugees. Today, we are looking in greater depth at what our church says about this issue.

IMMIGRATION: What does the Bible Say?

Throughout the Old and New Testaments, there are commands to take care of the immigrant, the stranger, or the resident alien. The nation of Israel were immigrants to Egypt and wandered in the desert before taking control of the Promised Land, and later experienced exile from that place. The Holy Family were refugees, fleeing Herod's persecution very shortly after Jesus' birth. Later, apostles were immigrants to many new countries, where they evangelized the natives.

- "You shall treat the alien who resides with you no differently than the natives born among you; have the same love for him as for yourself; for you too were once aliens in the land of Egypt" (Lv 19:33-34).
- "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me" (Mt 25:35).

IMMIGRATION: What does the Magisterium Say?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church says that people have a right to a dignified life, and the right to migrate to pursue that life. It also teaches that wealthier nations have a duty to accept immigrants and refugees.

- **2211** The political community has a duty to honor the family, to assist it, and to ensure especially: the right to private property, to free enterprise, to obtain work and housing, and the right to emigrate;
- **2241** The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the *foreigner* in search of the security and the means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin. Public authorities should see to it that the natural right is respected that places a guest under the protection of those who receive him.

Additionally, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops wrote a pastoral letter in conjunction with the Conference of Mexican Bishops called "Strangers no Longer: Together on the Journey of Hope." In it, they give advice for Catholics who want to know how to interact with migrants and immigrants, and remind us of the need to protect the life and dignity of every human person. They also offer some ideas for reforming the broken immigration system in the US.

IMMIGRATION: What's going on now?

Children in detention centers: In recent weeks, there was a policy that led to parents and children being separated and placed in detention at the border, even for families that were requesting asylum. While that policy has been reversed, and (hopefully) future families will not be separated, there are still many parents and children who have not been reconnected.

Separating families: Our government has adopted a "zero tolerance" policy, which means that entering the country without permission, which has historically been a civil offense similar to speeding, is now a criminal offense. The idea of deporting people is not new, nor is it partisan, (President Obama deported more individuals than any previous president). However, the difference now is that someone can be deported with no warning, and with no criminal charges, which can leave their family.

DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals): This abbreviation refers to a program started in 2012 to allow people who came to the US as children to apply for a status that makes them safe from deportation. It allows them to get a driver's license, receive a work permit, and go to college. The fate of this program is currently in question, and it looks like a new law will need to be written.

Refugee crisis: Around the world, there are over 25 million officially recognized refugees (and over 65 million displaced people). Refugees are different from other immigrants because they have been recognized by the UN as having to flee their country, usually because of violence. Refugees go through multiple screening processes, and then can apply to be placed in a host country. The US accepted only 50,000 refugees in 2017, much lower than 85,000 the previous year.

IMMIGRATION: What can we do?

It is important that we, as Catholics and as Americans, make our voices heard in reference to offering hope for the life of every person, welcoming the foreigner, and protecting family unity. The immigration system in our country is complicated, unequally applied, and frequently damaging. This can be seen within our own parish, where people live without documentation and have citizen children, which leads to fear and potential trauma for the whole family. We have to write letters, call our representatives, and vote our consciences in the public sphere. In addition, we can work to get to know our immigrant neighbors, and make sure we are welcoming them to the best of our ability.

LIBROS WITH LOVE



Please donate new or gently used books and DVDs in **SPANISH** for children at Virginia immigration facilities. These books will be supplied to the Capital Area Immigrant Rights Coalition (CAIR), who will bring them to various detention facilities. The children we are reaching out to have fled violence in their home

countries and are currently separated from their families, and this is one way we can support them. If you don't have a book, you can check out the wish list on Amazon by looking up "Libros with Love" under their "Registry" function.
