The topic of the first seminar will be: "Advanced Care Planning". Joining us will be an ethicist and physician from Bon Secours Richmond Health System. The speakers will discuss issues that often arise with advanced care planning such as: What is the difference between ordinary versus extraordinary care? What should I consider when creating an Advance Medical Directive or attaining a health care proxy? How do I maintain the integrity of my Catholic faith when making these decisions?

This seminar will be held on Tuesday, August 7, from 9:00am – 12:00pm and will be livestreamed from the Diocesan Pastoral Center in Richmond to both Saint Andrew in Roanoke and Saint Bede in Williamsburg. 

THE ENVIRONMENT

CREATION: What does the Bible Say?

Our faith is based on scripture and tradition, and the very first verse of the Bible is a reminder that God is the lord of all creation. Humans are called to be good stewards, caring for their environment rather than exploiting it. Many of the figures in the Old Testament talk about seeing God in the wonders of creation, especially in the psalms. Even in the Gospel, Jesus uses metaphors of created things to reveal truths about his Father's kingdom, reminding us that the environment can be a fruitful place for spiritual reflection, and one that should be protected.

- "The Lord God then took the man and settled him in the garden of Eden, to cultivate and care for it." (Gen 2:15)
- "Ask the beasts to teach you, the birds of the air to tell you; or speak to the earth to instruct you, and the fish of the sea to inform you. Which of all these does not know that the hand of God has done this? In his hand is the soul of every living thing, and the life breath of all mortal flesh." (Job 12: 7-10)
- "Praise Him, sun and moon; praise him, all shining stars. Praise him, highest heavens, you waters above the heavens. Let them all praise the Lord's name; for he commanded and they were created." (Ps 148: 3-5)

CREATION: What does the Magisterium Say?

Many people are familiar with the teaching and example of St. Francis of Assisi, patron saint of ecology and author of the Canticum of the Creatures. The church as a whole has endorsed this spirituality of recognizing God's revelation in creation, especially the two most recent popes. Pope Benedict XVI was known as "The Green Pope," and Pope Francis' encyclical "Laudato Si'" has made the church's teaching more broadly accessible.

- "The dominion granted by the Creator over the mineral, vegetable, and animal resources of the universe cannot be separated from respect for moral obligations, including those toward generations to come (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2456)
- "Preservation of the environment, promotion of sustainable development and particular attention to climate change are matters of grave concern for the entire human family." (Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI)
- Our insistence that each human being is an image of God should not make us overlook the fact that each creature has its own purpose. None is superfluous. The entire material universe speaks of God's love, his boundless affection for us. Soil, water, mountains: everything is, as it were, a caress of God. (Laudato Si', 84)

CREATION: What's going on now?

Global Warming: In chapter three of Laudato Si', Pope Francis emphasizes the scientific truth of climate change as illustrated by the consensus of the world's experts. While our planet has gone through periods of warming and cooling before, this trend is at a much faster pace, and caused by the pollution of humans.

Paris Climate Agreement: At the end of 2015, representatives from almost every nation in the world gathered in Paris and ratified an agreement to work toward keeping climate change to less than 2 degrees Celsius (for context, 2 degrees colder was the last ice age). Pope Francis and the Church support this agreement. Our government pulled out of our commitment to it in 2017, and the bishops issued a statement registering their disagreement with that action.

Atlantic Coast Pipeline: Dominion Energy is proposing a natural gas pipeline that would go through much of Virginia, and is currently on hold. The planned route would certainly affect and potentially pollute water supplies, as well as cutting through some "biodiversity hotspots" and the habitat of several endangered species.

CREATION: What can we do?

There are many places to go and resources to check out. The Global Catholic Climate Movement is a wonderful resource, as is the Catholic Climate Covenant. At the web site for each of these organizations, you can see ways to pledge to be a better steward of God's creation, or you can participate in writing letters to ask for change at the governmental level. On the day-to-day level of your own life, evaluate how your actions affect the world around us, and how you can better honor the creator of that world. Check out the "Environ-minute" in the bulletin for some hints, or look online. Cutting down on transportation, using renewable energies, and recycling goods, are all excellent first steps to take. Together, and with God's grace, we can make a difference and take care of our environment.

JABA (Jefferson Area Board for Aging) provides services and supports to help people age in the community of their choice. Volunteers make it happen! Help reduce a senior's isolation through weekly visits as a Neighbor-to-Neighbor Volunteer; Be trained to counsel people on their insurance options as an Insurance Counselor; Or be a voice for those in Nursing Homes, serving to ensure residents' rights are being protected as a Volunteer Ombudsman.
